Since 1999 until his passing, he was the President of the National Servicemen's Association (NSW Branch), he also served as Chair of the Anzac Day Dawn Service Trust since 2003 and in 2006 he was awarded the Medal of the Order of Australia for service to the ex-service community.

Ron and his wife Joan were always great supporters of our ANZAC Day and Remembrance Day Services and enjoyed visiting the school and interacting with the students.

Holsworthy High School would like to thank you for your service to Australia, Ron. May you rest in peace.














SPECIAL RECOGNITION





Laura's application and submitted work demonstrated her deep interest in Australian history as well as a genuine respect for the service.






Defence Transition Mentor Term 2 Update

"We are thrilled to congratulate Reg Chard on being awarded the OAM in today's Queens Birthday Honours.

Reg is one of our long-serving guides at the Kokoda Track Memorial Walkway and over the past two decades has earned the respect and love of thousands of school pupils with whom he has shared his personal stories of the New Guinea campaign during World War II.


Reg will celebrate his 98th birthday on 31 October, having enlisted when he was not quite 19, and then finding himself face to face with the enemy on the Kokoda Track within weeks of completing his initial training. Reg served with the 55/53rd Australian Infantry Battalion.

Two years ago Reg was given a standing ovation when he delivered the keynote address at our Kokoda Day commemoration service. He has also devoted many hours in helping with maintenance at the Memorial Walkway and the Rose Garden.

Reginald James Chard NX134343: we salute you for your service during WWII and for your untiring efforts to educate young Australians about the sacrifices made by your generation! Congratulations, Reg Chard OAM."

Each student rates the flavour and we have the students work out the average score to give us that flavours position.






I have challenged students by joining them in some of their school work. I have absolutely no ability when it comes to drawing, however I was able to watch a youtube video to draw this eye

which was something that some of our students had to submit. I figured if I could do it they could too.




School Transition Mentor Report continued

The above statement is something I can very closely identify with.

I have attended Anzac Day services at Hoteworthy High School for the pest 27 years and I am always very proud of the way our school community conducts itself at these special

commemorations. As a young child, I always attended the Anzac Day Service at our local Servicemens Oub

this an important day for us, in periouser my mum who is now \$1 years sid as she brings out the photo of my Grandfather and his medals for the day, I never knew my Crandfather as he passed away when I was very young. My Grandfather was an Engineer in the Second World War and was sent to Papua New Oursea.

We have a unique privilege at our school, where our school com-for our Veterans to attend and be part of our commemorations.

It has been very important for our school community and students but it has given me a link to my Grandfather through his involvement in the Second World War. It allows me to have a gimpse at the man I can only see through photographs through the men who are still.

What a privilege I have been given.

Thank You to our Veterans and their families as you are an inspiration to our school community in many different ways and I am honoured to have had the opportunity to be part of a school that supports and understands the importance of our connection to our Veterans.

Lastly and importantly we had the opportunity to raise money for Legacy this term. Our school always dedicates a week in September to selling merchandise at school, however this year we needed to raise money in a different way. Legacy had organised a Lunge for Legacy 2021 Event which we became involved in. Our staff and students participated in the event to reach our goal of 5,000 lunges which represents 1000 for 500+ families who have lost a veteran to suicide, 3000 for the number of families that are affected by suicide and 5000 for veterans who struggle with PTSD. As of the date of this newsletter our school has raised \$625 with an aim to make \$1,000. Thank you to everyone who helped raise this money for Legacy, I know how much they will appreciate it and the happiness it will bring to others.

Firstly, let me congratulate all the students and parents that survived the isolation learning period at home. I am sure it is something you will always remember. I know I will.


Most students did well working from home and some needed a little extra encouragement. It was difficult not seeing the students faces each day and only really communicating through emails.



To compliment Year 9's history lessons on WW2– **KOKODA EXPERIENCE AND CONDITIONS.** Reginald Chard WW2 Kokoda Veteran was generous enough to lets us ZOOM with him into school from his home in Villawood.

We also discovered that one of our families from Holsworthy High School is a relative of a soldier and friend that died next to Reg during WW2. Reg was able to talk to that family and tell them what he knew about their relative and show them some photos from his photo album.

There were some very moving moments between Reg and the students and I thank you all for participating.



AN ENGLISH SPEECH BY CHLOE FROM YEAR 9 -TOO GOOD NOT TO SHARE

As you scroll through your social media platforms, do you ever compare yourself to the images that you see? Looks don't matter, your perfect the way you are, beauty is only skin deep. We hear these sayings, and yet we live in a society where they don't follow these statements. If looks don't matter, why do people edit, use filters and wear makeup in photos, because it hides the flaws that they have? If looks don't matter, why do people have to be ashamed or insecure, because they are unhappy with their physical appearance. They are influence by the way society is promoting body image.

The use of social media has grown dramatically in last decade, making body image issues even a bigger problem. Is social media bad for your self-esteem? Studies show that 40% of the world uses social media platforms at least 2 hours per day. With social media playing a big part in our lives this is most likely going to affect your mental health. Social media offers the change to connect with others, but unfortunately hurts your self-esteem. At a young age we are trained that we have to look a certain way and have to wear certain things to be beautiful and pretty this is because we are influenced by what is displayed on our screens. What are displayed on our screens? Images that highlight perfection and ignore flaws.

What is the ideal body type?. In society there is an ideal body type and shape that people are convinced that they need to follow to feel and appear attractive. Everyone can and might feel insecure about their appearance at times. Studies show that body image issues are mainly associated with girls, but boys can be affected by it, too. Most people I know or spoken to have told me that they want to appear attractive by being slimmer, having abs and a smaller waist. I have had an experience when a younger girl has weighted a bit more than me, and they asked me why are you so skinny?, how are you so skinny?. I had to explain why I have an appearance like I do in the best way possible so she grows up knowing that no matter what you look like you're like that for a reason. Although i don't have bad mental health when it comes to body image issues, I do received bad comments such as, "you're to skinny", "eat more meat", "eat something", "are you anorexic". This is the reason why this world issues is a big problem because it affects peoples mental health and nobody, no one should have the right to shame or criticise someone appearance.

Do you ever have a feeling that you're not or will never be good enough? I admit that i have. I want to show people that it's alright having little insecurities but in the end you have to be proud in your own skin. In Australia 30% of women are concerned about their body image issues but boys have a lower percentage of 15.4%. You look and appear like that for reason, not matter what people say you're beautiful and no one should have the right to tell you otherwise. Social media might affect your thoughts about yourself but remember they only highlight perfection and ignore flaws. This is why social media plays a big role in peoples body image worries because their comparing themselves to what is shown on that platform and often think and judge themselves to be the worst.





Each year HHS sells merchandise to raise money for Legacy. Our students happily volunteer their recess and lunch times for this worthy charity.


HOLSWORTHY PUPILS CONTRIBUTE

Kokoda veteran lives to tell

More than 70 years since he fought on the Kokoda Track, the horrors of the jungle have never left Reg Chard.

"I wake up at half past two every morning ... it just never goes away, unfortunately," he said.

Mr Chard joined the army as soon as he turned 18 and in 1942, after the fall of Singapore, he and his fellow soldiers were sent to papua New Guinea to fight in the Kokoda Track campaign.

It was a place he'd "never heard of", though, and upon landing he was struck by the "unbearable" heat.

Hundreds of men died during the campaign and many more were wounded. Even greater numbers were struck down by tropical diseases, including Mr Chard, who collapsed on January 21, 1943 from scrub typhus and malaria. "I was a bloody mess. I don't remember anything at all" he said.

Now 95, the Villawood resident volunteers at the Kokoda Memorial Track Walkway at Concord, sharing his experiences with school students and visitors.

He has now been nominated for the Pride of Australia Medal, which recognises the remarkable contributions of members within the community.

Each year, Mr Chard recites the Ode of Remembrance at Holsworthy High School's Anzac day and Remembrance commemorations and presents awards to students.

The students give back by volunteering each year to help maintain the Kokoda Memorial Track Walkway

Challenges of being in a military family

Ten Seven Five. To you those might just be numbers, but to me they're much more. Ten is the amount of houses I have lived in. Seven is the number of schools I have attended. Five is the amount of months I have left here before I move to the next location and then those numbers become Eleven and Eight. This is the life of an army brat. Strange name isn't it? Let me try and give you an understanding of what it is like to be part of any army family.

How do you think you would cope with moving somewhere new every two years? Sometimes, you might move more often, sometimes less. The unknown, is something you have to get used to when you are a military kid. Frequent moves, parents getting deployed and finding a place to fit in, isn't always an easy task.

Anyone who has experienced a move knows how stressful it can be – and military life means moving a lot. With each move comes many transitions. Moving not only means a new home but also new neighbours, new classmates, new teachers and schools. The list goes on. Adapting to new people, places and things is hard for everyone, and children like me face various challenges as we work hard to adjust to our new surroundings.

Moving means not only adjusting to new things, but also having to leave things behind – best friends, favourite teachers, an excellent soccer coach, and more. You may even notice us struggling to leave things behind which will surprise you, such as a particular tree in our backyard, or our favourite parks to hang out at. Always having to "put yourself out there" and getting to know new people is tiring, especially if you know another move will be on the horizon which means starting over again. Frequent moving comes not only with stress of readjustment but also with feelings of sadness, grief, excitement and anxiety. This can leave military children feeling lonely or socially isolated.

Deployment is another challenge military families may come across. Families face a number of challenges before, during and after deployment. This emotional cycle of deployment begins when news of deployment is released to the family. It starts with a short period of strong emotions, such as fear and anger and sometimes excitement. As departure grows closer, a period of detachment and withdrawal may occur. This can happen to prepare for the person being physically gone. Then there is an adjustment period for when the defence member returns. Often the parent and children left at home have gotten used to doing things a certain way and have adjusted to having one parent doing everything. When the other parent gets home, it can take time for everyone to adjust to a new routine.

Sometimes, defence members do not return home from deployments the same as when they left. PTSD (post-traumatic stress disorder) is a very real and valid response to someone experiencing a severe trauma or life-threatening event. The person may experience flashbacks which usually involves auditory and visual memories of combat. Recovery from PTSD often requires professional help. They may also suffer from something called "Survivors Guilt". Suicide is a common concern amongst returning veterans. It is said that the Defence Force are great at making soldiers who go off to war but ar not very good at looking after them when they return. That is why days such as ANZAC Day and Remembrance Day are important to me and other military families.

Although being a military family has its perks such as using the phonetic alphabet, I hope I have bought an awareness to the many challenges I face. Overall, I believe being an army kid has made me and my siblings very resilient and adaptable to changes but that doesn't mean that we have it easy.

Recently, Holsworthy High School students held an awareness event to support Invictus athlete and Afghanistan veteran Rachel Kerrigan. It was initiated and driven by student Hannah Herron who'd been encouraged herself by Rachel. The Invictus Games is an international multi-sport event created by Prince Harry in which wounded, injured or sick armedservices personnel take part in sports, like wheelchair basketball, sitting volleyball and indoor rowing, invictus is Latin for "undefeated". Hannah arranged for Rachel to visit the school to address students about aspects of mental health and overcoming adversity. Here Hannah explains how Rachel has been a personal inspiration and why she was so thrilled to be able to share their friendship with the whole school.

THE comerstones of the <u>Invictus Games</u> are Inclusion, resilience and service which are important to me as a student living with a disability. I proposed our school sponsor an invictus athlete to inspire fellow students to support our veterans. The goals included raising awareness of the Games and the athletes and raising funds to help pay for training and equipment — aiming for \$5000 over two years. I wanted to support veteran athlete Rachel Kerrigan as our first recipient.

Rachel addressed the students at ANZ Stadium as part of the invictus Education Project last October and I wanted to invite her to share her story with our school.

I was interested in Rachel's story because she used to work on planes in the RAAF, like my father at Cantas

At ANZ Stadium, Rachel came over and introduced herself. I was in the wheelchair section. We talked and had a photo and I felt Rachel saw me as a whole person, not just someone in a wheelchair. She arranged for her contact details to be passed onto my Mum and me.

wheelchair basketball.

She said wheelchair basketball could be a sport I might enjoy and invited me to see some games and meet her Wheelchair Sports NSW team. Rachel and my Mum Richelle exchanged messages and before I knew it Rachel had invited Mum and me to see the semi-finals of the wheelchair basketball with her and her daughter! Rachel also introduced me to members of the Australian wheelchair team, the Wheelle Diggers! Rachel is trying to qualify for the 2020 invictus Games in The Netherlands.

Rachel was approached by invictus for an interview with us as they'd heard we'd connected. She got us tickets to the wheelchair-basketball finals and we saw Prince Harry and Meghan arrive!

Rachel has inspired me to seek out new experiences, like wheelchair basketball. She told me about a junior camp at Narrabeen Sport & Rec for young people in wheelchairs. She inspires me because she lives with anxiety like I do but she doesn't let it control her life. Meeting her has changed my life. She's supporting me to open new doors and actively experience sport for the first time. I'm inspired by her and excited about the new activities.

I'd like to give back to her. Supporting her dream of competing in the 2020 invictus Games would do that, and it'll help with her continued recovery.

FAMILIES from Holsworthy High School commemorated 100 years since the World War I Armistice on November 9 and paid respect to all Australian Defence Force personnel who've fought.

A total of 72 students from 55 families at the school have parents who serve in the Australian Defence Force.

A historic flagpole monument was unveiled at the event which was restored to it's glory days in WWII when the school grounds were used as a military corrective e stablishment and later as a training facility for Vietnam soldiers.

Defence school transition mentor Tracey Carr explained history of the school's grounds.

"In WWII it served as a military corrective establishment which was like a gaol for military personnel. It was used to train to the Vietnam veterans as well and in WWI it's where the light horses trained which were sent to wag' she said.

"We have Vietnam war veterans who attended and

at the moment who were invited because their children attend the school. Its important for them to know weappreciate their sacrifices and bravery."

Other visitors who attended the ceremony included MP Melanie Gibbons and one of the two remaining survivors of the Kokoda campaign, veteran Reg Chard, 95.

Ms Carr thanked Ms Gibbons, Defence Health and Bunnings who funded the restoration of monuments.

"The flag pole was overgrown and there was a sandstone circle which the green crewhelped to recover. They got rid of the trees and

veterans who are still serving planted Rosemary. Students also helped the construction crew with the re-cementing of the standstone.

HOLSWORTHY HIGH SCHOOL



Holsworthy High School has a strong connection with the Defence Force, being located near the Holsworthy Barracks in Sydney. Students explored the meaning of service and their links to the defence community by hosting a special Invictus Games event at their school. Students met invictus competitor and motivational speaker Damien Thomlinson, who shared his experiences of service and the Games. Damien is an Afghanistan veteran who inspired students with his stories of service and resilience. Students also met Reg Chard, the last surviving Kokoda veteran who saw combat in Papua New Guinea in the second World War.



Holsworthy High School was selected in a ballot for a scholarship tour for 2019. ONE student will participate in a study tour to Germany, France and Belgium to commemorate the role of the Anzacs.

The tour is for students studying Modern History, and will further develop their knowledge and understanding of World Wars I and II. The New South Wales government through the Office of Veterans Affairs, will meet the cost of the tour: airfares and coach travel; accommodation; meals; official clothing.

There will be twenty students from NSW in total participating in the tour.

Interested students from our school had to complete a piece of work which focused on the role of Australians in our wartime history, and the impact on our nation.

- The importance of commemoration
- The effect of the wars on communities in Australia
- The role of women in both wars
- The impact of the wars on returned soldiers

The school conducted a process to select three candidates for the 2019 scholarship.



The Office of Veterans Affairs selected the final candidate – KEIRA HINE who wrote a series of diary entries from a WW1 soldier's perspective.

Remembrance day

I was the lucky recipient of the Premiers Anzac Memorial Scholarship that is a study tour created by the veteran of affairs to show 20 selected student from around NSW the importance of commemoration and remembrance and to give students an opportunity to visualise the battlegrounds of WW1 and 2, in Germany Belgium and France.

We started the tour off in the lower part of Germany (the Bavarian state), with the main focus of looking at ww2 and how it happened. We explored Munich's third Reich sites, the places where Hitler held meetings and started the Nazi party and but mainly Dachau concentration camp. These sites were amazing to see and walking through and looking at the confronting concentration camp left you with a surreal and solemn feeling.

From here we moved up to Nuremberg where we looked at the famous Nazi rally grounds, Courtroom 600 used for the Nuremberg trials, the documentation centre and the underground bunkers used to shelter civilians during the air raids. The rally grounds, in my opinion, was the most interesting as you got to see how they manipulated people and their plans for the future, also to see the contrast between the before during and after ww2.

From here we kept travelling up north to Berlin where we visited sites like the Jewish museum, the holocaust memorial, the berlin wall, Brandenburg gate and learnt more about why and how Hitler rose to power. We were in Berlin on the 30 year anniversary of the Berlin Wall coming down, the history of the city is still raw and residents are still seeing the effects of the berlin wall going up.

After Berlin, we flew to Belgium doing a time jump from ww2 to ww1. We stayed at a peace village built on the WW1 battlefields of mesen, which was set up to hold tour groups in the hope of getting big groups to see and discover the history of ww1. Here we visited many commonwealth cemeteries, amazing historic battlefields of the Ypres salient like the battlegrounds of Passchendaele, Messines, polygon wood and more and also got to see recreated trenches and some remains of the concrete bunkers used by Germans and allies. This was also a personal part of the tour as my great grandfather served on those battlefields.

During our time in Ypres, we were fortunate enough to be given the opportunity to be the guards of honour for the service at meinin gate that is held every night rain, hail or shine. This was an amazing experience that I'll never forget and was truly a highlight of the trip, we laid a reef and were able to talk to many people from around the world some who were there for a fallen family member, surviving members and some just there to pay their respects.

Following here we travelled into France where we looked at the evacuation beach of Dunkirk and looked at the sites of the D-Day landing. This was a great part of the trip as we got to see the marine and aircraft side to war something we hadn't previously focused on and we were able to stand on the beaches that were apart of the largest seaborne invasion in history.

The final part of the trip was one day in Paris, this was the best ending to a great trip. We spent the day sightseeing and going on a nice cruise down the river canal.

This trip and experience is something I will never forget and recommend that everyone goes and explores these amazing sites. I learnt so much and grew a more thorough understanding of both WW1 and WW2, I met lifelong friends and became a lot be more grateful for how we live back home. A massive thank you to the school and Ms carr for helping make this happen and supporting me through this journey.
