PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

In my last Newsworthy article at the end of last term, I wrote about my hope that things would be returning to normal by now. I am very pleased that this is the case, not only at school, but also in the community, with many businesses reopening recently. From a school perspective, we are now able to resume school assemblies and year meetings which are both important methods of communication with our students. As of the beginning of next term, we will also be able to recommence work experience and work placement for our Stage 6 VET students and recommence some activities involving students from other schools. At this stage, however, camps and school based activities that involve large gatherings of adults including parent attendance at assemblies are still not possible. We are obviously hoping that this will change in time for our Year 12 Graduation assembly which is scheduled for the first week of Term 4 this year.

Although many things were put on hold during Term 1, we are now in a position to start a number of initiatives that we had planned for this year. One of our main projects for 2020 is a technology trial that was originally due to commence at the beginning of this term. The aim of the trial is to determine an appropriate device to use as the basis of a more structured and effective BYOD (Bring Your Own Device) program to be implemented at Holsworthy High School as of next year. The trial will involve one class from Year 7 and one from Year 8 and is due to conclude at the end of Term 3.

In conjunction with this trial, we have been very fortunate to have developed a partnership with Western Sydney University. Associate Professor Catherine Attard and Professor Kath Holmes will

be assisting us to collect evidence to inform our decision making as part of a 3 year research project they are undertaking. The research will involve interviews with key staff, including myself, classroom observations and teacher, student and parent surveys. We look forward to working with the university as the partnership develops.

Finally, there is no doubt that the best thing that has happened at Holsworthy High School this term is our students and staff returning to school on a full-time basis. While things may not be completely back to normal, I am hopeful that we have got through the most difficult part largely due to the way that we have all worked together and supported each other in recent months. I would like to thank our staff, students and parents for the way they have all contributed to what has been a difficult time. I am very grateful for your support and extremely proud of the way we have all navigated our way through these challenges.

At the time of finalising this edition of Newsworthy, we learnt of the sad passing of Mr Peter Ward, Principal of Holsworthy Public School. We would like to send our condolences and deepest sympathies to our friends and neighbours at Holsworthy Public School – the staff, students and their families. Mr Ward's passing has had a significant impact on us, as many of our students attended Holsworthy Public School. On a personal note, I will always be grateful to Peter for the support he gave me when I started here as Principal. He helped me a great deal in my first year here and is a major reason that our two schools have such a close relationship now.

Deputy Report

We would like to start with a thanks to the parents, students and teachers who made a good effort in the difficult circumstances of the last few months. While things were consistently changing, many students remained committed to their learning and the support from parents in this time was very pleasing. There are a number of things that continue despite the changes and challenges.

Many Year 10, a few Year 11 and very few Year 12 students will be, or have, attempted National Minimum Standards Tests in the last few weeks. Information has been emailed to students and parents and further information is available at <https://www.educationstandards.nsw.edu.au/wps/portal/nesa/11-12/hsc/hsc-minimum-standard>. If you have any concerns or questions regarding National Minimum Standards please contact Mr. Roebuck or Mr. Grew. Also available on the NESA website are log in details for Students Online. Students Online at <https://studentonline.nesa.nsw.edu.au/> provides clear information on a number of HSC matters, including individual exam timetables. Year 10 and 11 students can also access Students Online for matters relevant to them. For the HSC, students can visit <https://educationstandards.nsw.edu.au/wps/portal/nesa/11-12/hsc/rules-and-processes/rules-procedures-guide-students> to have absolutely current information regarding the HSC. Section 5 is full of simple information that relates to exam rules, attendance, equipment and behaviour.

Students will still be required to complete mandatory school assessments over the coming weeks and terms. For students in Years 10-12 assessments are supported by notifications from individual teachers. If your

child is concerned about assessments they should seek assistance through their classroom teacher, Ms. Baxter in the Library or through Ms. Siqueira and the Learning Support Team. While some dates and tasks have been rescheduled due to Covid, the Assessment Booklets on the school website provide useful information around assessment practices and course completion.

As I write, Year 11 Half Yearly reports are being distributed. Year 12 Half Yearlies have been distributed and reports for Years 7-10 will be issued in coming weeks. I would encourage parents to consider outcomes, grades and student responsibilities when they look at their child's reports. Students also set goals on their reports and are interviewed by Year Advisers at the point of distribution. There have been some adjustments to the report format to accommodate some Covid concerns.

Finally, please be careful when making uniform purchases for your child. If unsure of the requirement please go to <https://holsworthy-h.schools.nsw.gov.au/about-our-school/rules-and-policies/school-uniform-policy.html> to check the guidelines. Also, some subjects have specific shoe requirements so check with your child and the school if required. If you have financial concerns around accessing the uniform for your child please contact one of the Deputies and we can arrange supports.






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ENGLISH and DRAMA NEWS

THE GREAT 40 BOOK CHALLENGE




Students, staff & Barnaby are getting their reading on with the 40 Book Challenge! Most participants have read 20 books so far this year, others are getting close to the 40 book mark!

Holsworthy High School Technology Trial.

Over the next two terms students in 8I and 7E are taking part in a technology trial with Chromebooks and iPads. The school has decided to trial the devices to see the benefits of students having their own personal device which is always available to them and to also test which device is most preferred by both students and teachers.

Students were extremely excited to receive their devices last Friday and have settled in to using them in their classes this week, reporting that it is easier for them to complete class work with their devices and that their lessons are now more exciting. Teachers are finding that students are more focused, creative and challenging themselves with their learning. Throughout the trial students and their teachers will be asked for their feedback on greater technology access and engagement in classes.



The school has partnered with the University of Western Sydney who are undertaking a study of our trial which aims to determine the impact on engagement and learning, through the use of the devices in class and the varied learning opportunities that technology can bring to the classroom. Students and staff in the trial will periodically be interviewed and take part in focus groups to monitor the progress of the trial.

Congratulations to all students involved in the trial, as they have all remembered to bring their device fully charged ready for learning each day.

Year 10 History Student Work

Year 10 History students completed fantastic work during the topic 'Changing Rights and Freedoms'. I am so impressed with the quality of their work, and the strong empathy they show in their writing.

Below are examples of work completed by students during online learning earlier in the term.

TASK 1 -

Students were asked to write a 200 word response to the 2008 National Apology delivered by newly elected Prime Minister Kevin Rudd.

On the 13th of February, 2008, the Prime Minister Kevin Rudd delivered the National Apology to Australia's Indigenous Peoples. In particular, it included an apology to the Stolen Generations. The Apology is now considered a defining moment in Australian history.

It states Australia's apology to its indigenous peoples, apologising for the mistreatment during the period known as the Stolen Generations and acknowledging the wrongs that people have done towards Aboriginal People. In my opinion it was a significant thing to do that most people would appreciate because it was the first time in Australian history that someone has addressed the unfairness and apologised. Kevin Rudd said sorry to all the brothers, sisters, fathers and mothers for their ancestors and all the children that had been taken away from their families.

Kevin Rudd has made one of the most memorable speeches that will be remembered in history.





Recipe of the month

Fairy bread melting moments

Makes 12



Ingredients

250g butter, chopped, at room temperature
60g (1/3 cup) icing sugar mixture
1 teaspoon vanilla extract
225g (1 1/2 cups) plain flour
70g (1/2 cup) custard powder, plus extra, to dust
120g (1/2 cup) hundreds and thousands, plus extra, to decorate

Filling

100g butter, chopped, at room temperature
1 tsp vanilla extract
125g (3/4 cup) icing sugar mixture

Method

1. Preheat oven to 170°C/150°C fan forced. Line 2 large baking trays with baking paper. Use electric beaters to beat the butter, icing sugar and vanilla in a bowl until pale and creamy.
2. Sift over the flour and custard powder. Use a flat-bladed knife in a cutting motion to mix until a soft dough forms. Add the hundreds and thousands and mix until well combined.
3. Roll level tablespoonfuls of dough into balls, making sure you have an even number of dough balls (24 for 12 biscuits). Place on prepared trays, leaving room for spreading. Use a fork dipped in extra custard powder to press the balls into 4cm rounds (they should be about 1.5cm thick)
4. Bake, swapping trays halfway through cooking, for 18 minutes. Set aside on trays for 5 minutes to cool slightly then transfer to a wire rack to cool completely




SRC REPORT

Most students did well working from home and some needed a little extra encouragement. It was difficult not seeing the students faces each day and only really communicating through emails.




