The Police and Justice Museum is an enjoyable and interesting place to learn about how our legal system developed and students get to participate in a mock trial. The famous Pyjama Girl murder mystery is a feature exhibit at the museum.





Students also have the opportunity to listen to guest speakers from the Police Service or to a barrister. Here, they learn first hand about the law and its application in society.
